I hope all of you are doing well and enjoyed a good summer and fall season. With the restrictions from COVID lifting, I hope you were able to travel, go on vacation and get outdoors. It has been an eventful summer and fall for Jackie and I. We were expecting a posting this summer that would keep me at a unit in Kingston, but after some significant personal issues came up with some of my colleagues, we found ourselves posted across the country to Vancouver Island, to an Airforce Base in Comox, BC. Not what we were expecting at all!

Jackie and I celebrated our 35th anniversary this fall and we had planned to take a Baltic cruise to celebrate. The cruise was cancelled back in May due to ongoing COVID concerns and the conflict in Ukraine, so instead we went to PEI and enjoyed a couple of weeks golfing, cycling, looking for sea glass and eating too much COWS ice cream. While on the island we received the news that we were posted to Comox, so we packed up, drove back to Kingston, promptly put the

house on the market and began planning a cross country move. The house sold in three weeks, and in early August we made a house hunting trip to Comox and with some effort and shock at the prices, we found a nice townhouse in a hamlet called Little River.

The new house is nice, part of a very small HOA of seven units built in what used to be a campground. There are big trees, white capped mountains in the distance, and the Georgia Strait about half a block away.

The Strait, the ocean that lies between the mainland and Vancouver Island, is well known for its abundant sea life and Jackie and I cycle down to the water often, binoculars and coffee in hand, to sit and watch humpbacks, orcas, dolphins, sea lions and bald eagles.
